As you settle in Toronto, there are a number of resources and services available through the City of Toronto to help make your transition easier. Many of the services are free or subsidized.

Subsidized Housing

Emergency Shelter, Housing Supports, Subsidized Housing

provides housing services and supports to assist vulnerable people to find a range of emergency shelter and affordable housing options, while helping to create and maintain permanent housing solutions. The services include:

- Temporary shelter and support services for homeless individuals and families. For assistance, call Central Intake (24 hours a day) at 416-397-5637 or 1-877-338-3398 (toll-free within the Greater Toronto Area)
- Housing supports for people who are homeless or at risk of homelessness to find and stabilize their housing situations, including housing search, eviction prevention, information and referrals, pre-employment supports, and follow-up supports for homeless clients who are housed. - Creating affordable housing solutions through federal and provincial funding, including new affordable housing, and housing allowance and rent supplement programs
- Maintaining over 94,000 units of social housing (including Toronto Community Housing) for low-income residents and funding for the City's centralized social housing access system.

Health Services



Toronto Public Health provides many free programs and services that do not require a health card. This includes:

- Vaccination services for school-aged children (aged 4 to 17 years) who need to be immunized to attend school
- Dental services for eligible children and youth, adults enrolled in selected Toronto Public Health programs, and seniors
- Pregnancy, afterbirth, and parenting programs, counselling and support
- Healthy eating classes for parents of young children
- Breastfeeding clinics and support
- Confidential sexual health services for women and men
- Other health information and educational programs.

Employment and Financial Assistance

Employment and Social Services is a City division that provides employment supports, financial benefits and social supports to people living in Toronto.

Employment Centres are open to all Toronto residents. Services include help with:

- Finding a job or getting the help necessary to look for work
- Connecting to health, housing, childcare and other social services.

If you need financial help, you may qualify for benefits through the Ontario Works program.
