
## Quick overview of Economic Outcomes of Immigrants

- Immigrants have tended to do worse in terms of economic outcomes for more recent cohorts
- Falling entry earnings and generally the earnings assimilation has not been fast enough to catch up to the average earnings of the Canadian born
- ... wide range of estimates of the Fiscial Burden
- ... Policy changes for better selection.



## Earnings by Immigrant Cohort conditioning on Education, Males ( > Females )







## Weekly Earnings ( $e^{\beta} - 1$ ) by Cohort and Prov., Males. ( • Females )




#### Occupational Analytical Requirements by Cohort and Prov., Males.


### Occupational Physical Strength Requirements by Cohort and Prov., Males.








## How to choose immigrants who will integrate economically?

Canadian Experience Class type programme  $successful \rightarrow$ 

- applicant has Canadian work experience / education
- double selection process

## Reason's for CEC

#### **TFWs**

- not experience the same difficulty with the portability of their human capital
  - $\rightarrow$  skills have already been recognized by at least one Canadian employer

#### International students

- obtained their education in Canada should receive a "normal" return to their education
- presumably their language skills and Canada-specific knowledge should be appropriate to the Canadian labour market


- ► TFW better outcomes than recent immigrants (Warman 2010)
- ► Former TFWs better early outcomes than other Economic Immigrants (Sweetman and Warman (2014) and Hou and Bonikowska (2015))
- Mixed outcomes for Former International Students, but still early . . .

## Post-secondary Education

Large number of international students (good pool of potential immigrants...)

Potential considerations:

- ► Language skills acquired by immigrants in schools where large proportion of students do not speak English(/French) ... little emphasis placed on writing skills
- Impacts how education is delivered and how students are assessed.
  - Also have an impact on quality of education of domestic students



# Other considerations/future needed research: What is the required Age at arrival and Economic Success?

#### Net contributor . . .

- Need to earn a certain income to be a net contributor (cover own social services)
- ▶ Lifecycle → cover retirement (may look good in a cross-section . . .)
- ► Immigration has only a negligible impact on "average" age of population (→ although impact likely larger in Atlantic/Rural areas.)

## Other Considerations/Tough Decisions . . . continued

Sending immigrants to places with out migration ... Locals can't find jobs ...

- Sending immigrants there always make sense? . . .
  - language ability issues, credential issues, lack of knowledge of local job market . . .
  - immigrants having problems integrating economically, why expect them to be successful in places the domestic born are not?

Cost of servicing small and rural areas is very expensive

Cost of water, schooling, roads, hospitals etc...

## Why Canadians are being offered cash to abandon their homes

On the far eastern edge of Canada sits Little Bay Islands, a beautiful, dying village divided by crisis. The fish plant was shuttered half a decade ago, and most supporting businesses – as well as the school – have closed with it. Perry Locke is among the tiny population that's left. He served as the mayor, the fire chief and now runs the power-generating station. His son was the last student enrolled in town.


Fishing villages like this one built Newfoundland and Labrador, a coastal province sent into a tailspin by a fishery collapse, oil-price slump and mounting debt that left it with Canada's most severe fiscal and demographic crisis. The provincial government now is pushing to close places like Little Bay Islands altogether rather than service them, offering Locke and his neighbors at least \$250,000 (US\$189,000) each to leave — and spurring a bitter, three-year fight over whether to cash out or endure.


- TFW & International Students can be a good pool to draw immigrants from

## Earnings by Immigrant Cohort conditioning on Education, Females( Males )



### **Earnings by Admission Category, Females**( • Males )



## Visible Minorities with Neither English/French as Mother Tongue from Non-Western Countries ( FullSamp )


